CSU Campus Departments with Online Syllabi

CSU campuses are not required to provide detailed course information online or before the first day of class. All campuses provide brief course descriptions with prerequisites (if applicable) and credit/unit values in their campus "catalog" or "bulletin" located on each campus website. A few campus departments, however, make their syllabi for courses taught in the past available online. Refer to the table below for a listing of these departments.

Once accepted to a CSU campus, exchange students can contact the campuses directly to make requests for detailed course information, if available.

Note the following:

- The information in the above table may not be a complete listing of departments that make their syllabi available online and is subject to change.
- Exchange students select courses at the undergraduate level only.
- Courses may not be offered each year or each term, and if offered, may be unavailable. Exchange students should plan to select additional courses in the event that courses are not offered or unavailable.
- Syllabi for courses in the upcoming year(s) may or may not be the same as those from past years. The most recent syllabi for courses will be available on the first day of class and may not be available beforehand.
- Course numbers help to identity the level of the course. To understand course levels, refer to the information on our website found <u>here</u>.
- Course descriptions and most syllabi contain the credit (or unit) value given to the course based on teaching (contact) hours and out-of-classroom work. To understand the CSU credit system, refer to the information in the section "CSU Definition of a Credit Hour" on our website found <u>here</u>.
